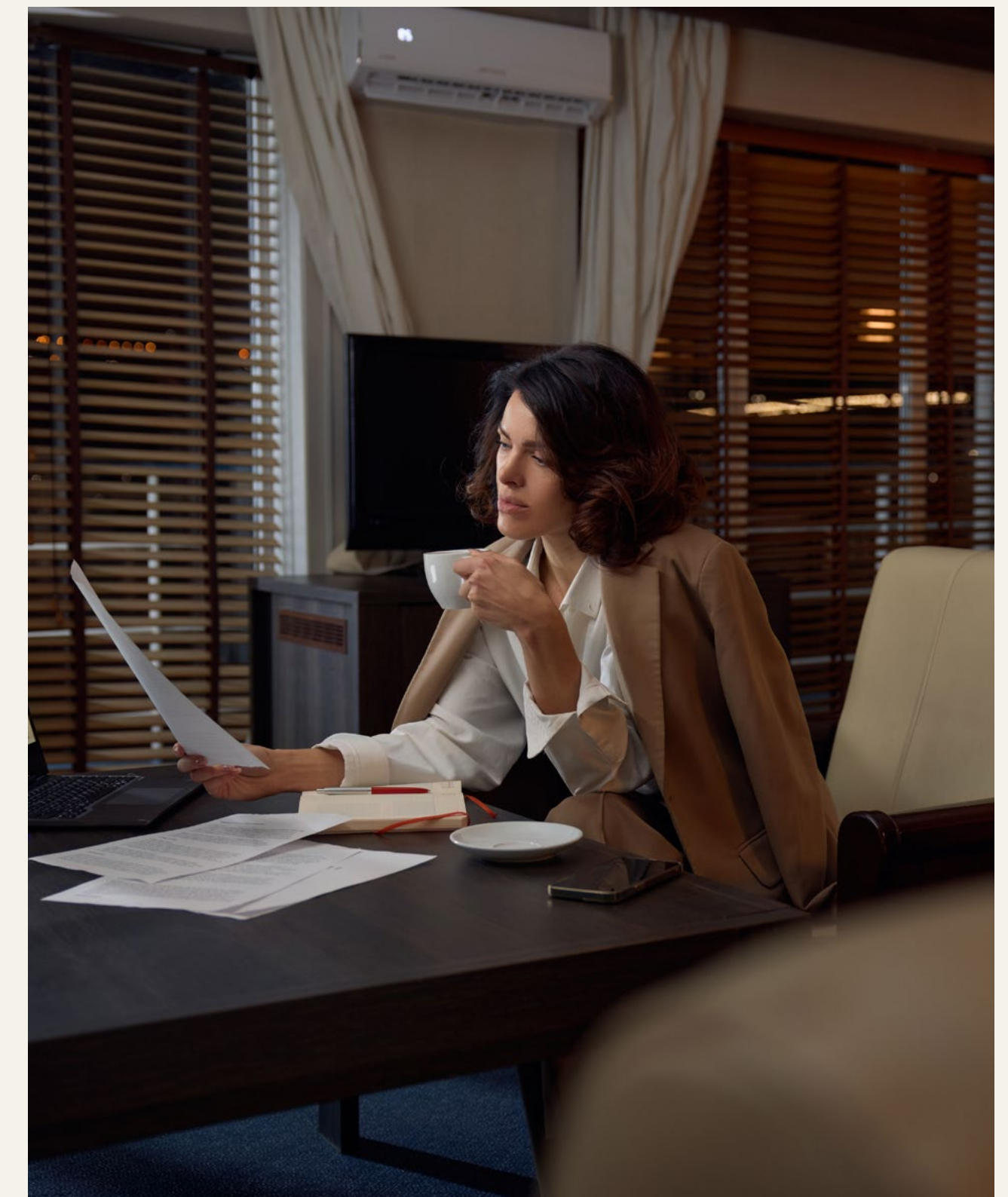

LOBBY

Lobbies are becoming more and more multi-purpose places. For sure, they are not what they used to be years ago when people just used to sit there reading books, talking, waiting. They are slowly turning to a common place for visitors holding short meetings. This means that lighting should provide an environment that is not just good looking but also suitable for work-related tasks. During the day, lighting should complement daily light creating a pleasant and warm atmosphere, and at night emphasize the lines of architecture and interior design.

Set the mood in a subtle way

BAR

Mood lighting is the one that prevails when building a bar as it sets people right into the mood. But a bar is not only a place of fun and relaxation, it is also a working space and as such has to provide the lighting which reduces errors and increases the concentration of the staff.

Different layers of lighting for different needs and activities

Most guests only use hotel rooms when it's dark, so lighting plays an important role in creating their overall experience in the hotel. Different layers of lighting in a room allow the guest to adapt the illumination to different needs and activities but also make the room photogenic when promoting it online.

With a good interior design and illumination, you can set up what your guest will see first when arriving in the room and create a perfect first impression when opening the door.





The perception of cleanliness starts with the bed

Natural cotton for bedding provides a crisp white look and feel, completing the healthy sleep sensory experience and supporting the perception of hygiene. With light, we can direct the focus to the bed and enhance the cleanliness, without introducing a clinical look and feel.

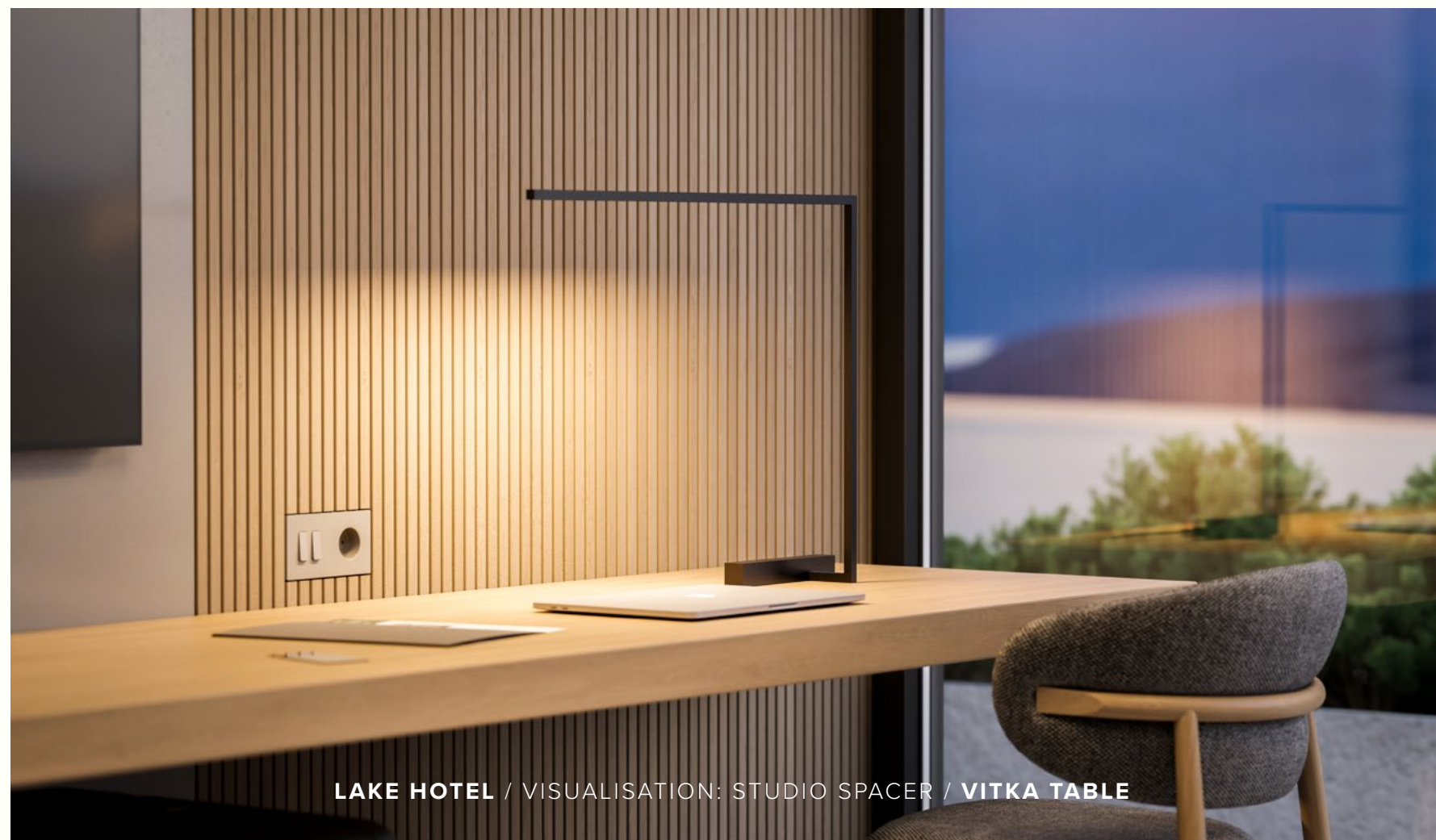
Romantic scene - a candle replacement

You can choose between a decorative piece that provides ambient light and creates a focal point, or a hidden fitting that displays only light, offering more flexibility for space reorganization.

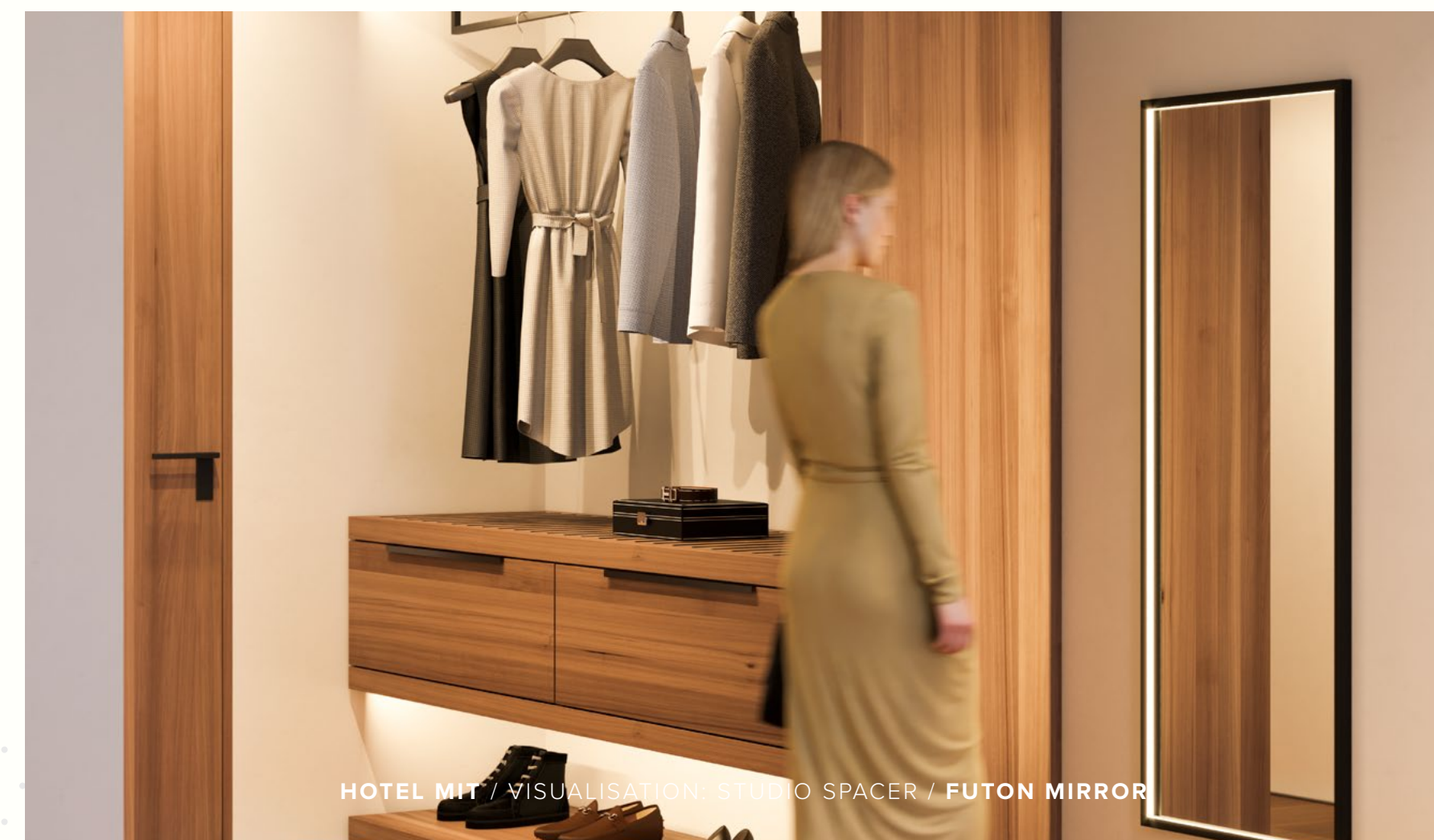


The business traveller office is a representation of the company

Although hotel social areas are getting bigger and multifunctional, the issues of noise, privacy and focus work would make it easier to work or have a video call from the room. Especially on that occasion, face illumination is essential, and the room surrounding becomes an extension of your company. While doing work on the computer, task illumination is needed while avoiding glare from the window sunlight.

See the colours and textures when dressing up

Anybody who knows the struggle of dressing up in a room with bad lighting would want to create a bright area without hard shadows and colour distortions. Choosing the right illumination for this area is essential to represent colours and textures in the best way. Light's direction is also important to eliminate shadows on the face and body (like cellulite). We suggest combining the illumination from the front with the illumination from the ceiling.



Focus on the book, not to everything around

When reading, it is important to focus bright task light on the reading area without disturbing the person next to you with excessive illumination and avoid uncomfortable eye strain. The durability of the product is crucial since it will be rotated frequently.



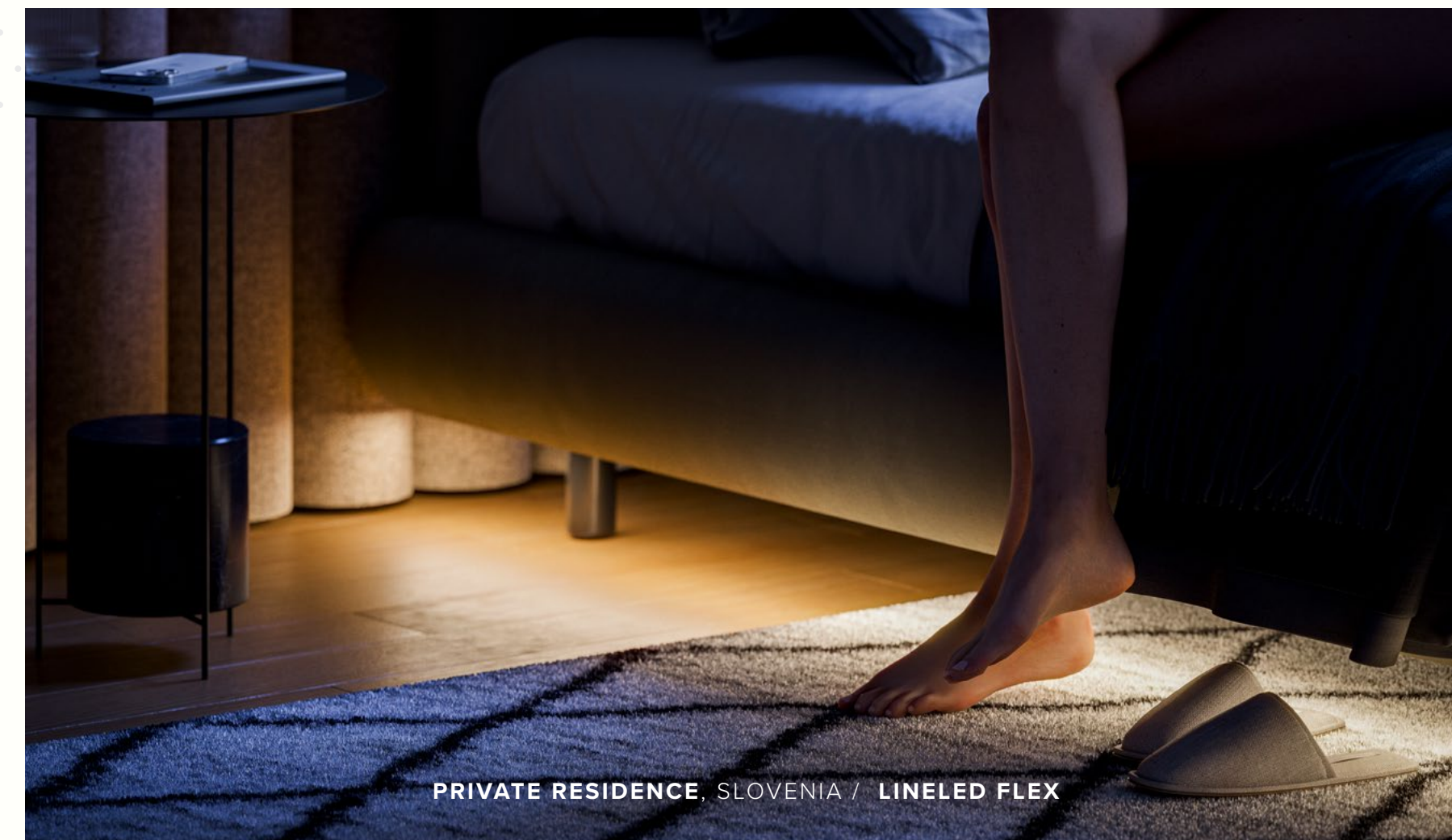
The darker the room the better the sleep

The main issue is how to provide darkness since many electronic devices, such as TV, alarm clocks, fridges, air conditioning and street lighting, emit unwanted light.

Tailoring lighting to prevent insomnia and simulate circadian rhythms is key to improving circadian health and facilitating jet lag for long-distance travellers. In fact, our internal, light-timed circadian rhythms control almost every body system: from our sleep/wake cycles to our immune and metabolic systems.

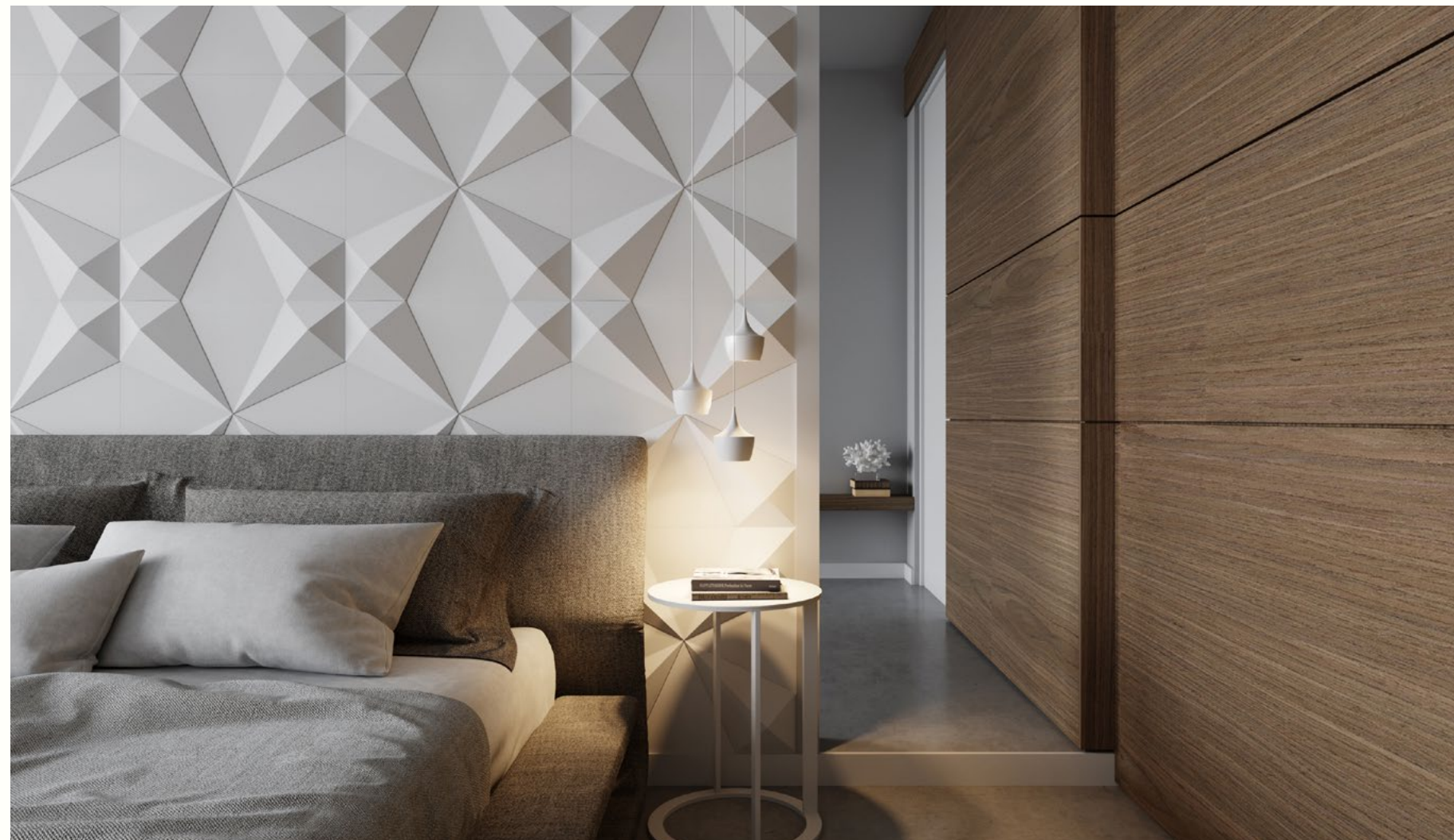
Going to the toilet at night is already annoying, don't make it worse with bright light.

With the movement sensor, there are no worries about switching on all the lights and waking up the partner. With soft, warm light, the disruption to circadian rhythms is minimized, and guests can get a consistent night's sleep.

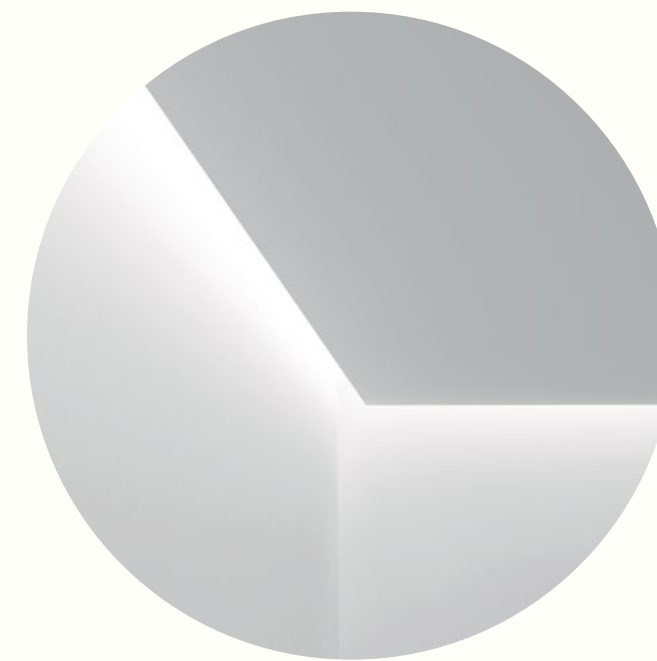

BATHROOM

Usually there is no daylight in a bathroom. Bathroom serves different purposes at different times of the day. For this reason, lighting should go beyond ON and OFF, including dimming and special lighting settings for different occasions. In the morning lighting should be brighter, whereas at the night, warmer. It should also cover different areas of the bathroom separately, one covering mirror, the other one shower, toilet, etc. Also temperature and moist should be taken into consideration.



The way you look depends on the light

The lateral light is the best solution for bathrooms. It eliminates harsh shadows.



For no steam and a clear mirror surface

Futon mirror with heater is ideal for bathrooms, especially those with inadequate ventilation. A special mirror demister warms up the mirror at 30-35°C, a perfect temperature to prevent the mirror surface from condensation of steam. You'll always have a crystal clear mirror surface.

No problems to find the room

Corridors lead to guests' rooms and often lack natural light, so they should be properly illuminated. Strong general illumination is not necessary; the key is to ensure guests can navigate without getting lost. Corridors should be at least minimally illuminated 24/7. By choosing efficient lighting products, a considerable amount of energy can be saved.





Find your room immediately

Ok, they can be long, but there is really no need for them to be dark, uninviting, sometimes even scary. Turning corridors from dark tunnels to bright and colourful passages has a lot to do with colouring walls and ceilings into light colours and choosing an indirect lighting to enhance the pleasant feeling in the space. One of the details you can think of is also the illumination of room numbers that will give a hotel corridor an elegant touch. Long corridors can be also optically shortened by pools of intense light.

The biggest energy savers

Corridors are places with no natural light. Therefore, when planning a corridor lighting, safety, orientation and a pleasant ambience are first things to do. But it is not all about the looks! Corridors can be the biggest energy savers at the hotel, so it is recommended to use movement detectors and high-quality lighting with low energy consumption.
